FOURTEEN YANOMAMI INDIANS ARE SLAUGHTERED BY MINERS

Another savage crime was committed in Brazil against the Yanomami Indians, who live on the border with Venezuela. Seven children, five women, and two of the Homoxi/Rtu village were murdered this week by miners; it seems that the children were beheaded. The information was provided by the minister of Justice, Maurício Correia, in a statement on the Charter of the Indians at the Chamber of Deputies. Information got about that at least five other Yanomami were killed in July, also by miners.

The slaughter occurred at the same time that a campaign is being promoted in Brazil against the right of Indian peoples to land areas. Under the pretext of defending the Brazilian sovereignty, businessmen and congressmen for Roraima, the State where the Yanomami area is located, have assumed positions against the demarcation of the lands of this people. Deputy Nicias Ribeiro even proposed an amendment to the Constitution prohibiting the demarcation of Indian lands located on the border. In order to justify his bill, the deputy cites the Yanomami territory as an example of a "large" area.

The position of the congressmen only serves to stimulate actions against the Indians. When killing the Yanomami, the miners surely felt supported by those who have been uttering statements against Indian peoples, who are being accused of being potential separatists and enemies of Brazil's development. The facts, however, show that they are victims of the greed of miners, landowners, woodcutters and mining companies, who want to take possession of Indian lands at any cost.

Of all Indian peoples in Brazil, the Yanomami is the one which has suffered most aggressive acts against Indians in recent years. Between 1987 and 1991, at least two-thousand Yanomami were exterminated by miners who invaded their territory. Less deaths have been registered since the area was demarcated, but about 600 miners are still active in their territory.

The government is requesting the help from the Armed Forces to avoid a new wave of violence against the Yanomami. A helicopter of the Brazilian Air Force was sent to the location where the fourteen Yanomami were killed. According to the National Indian Foundation, the Yanomami who live in Homoxi/Itu left the village and seeking protection in assistance stations.

CIMI (Indianist Missionary Council) sent a note to the government demanding the investigation of the slaughter, the conviction of the guilty ones, and the removal of all invaders from the area. In the note, it also warns the authorities that the campaigns against Indian rights may lead to further acts of genocide.

GENOCIDE BEGAN IN 1987 AND HAS KILLED ABOUT 2 THOUSAND YANOMAMI SO FAR

The number of Yanomami Indians slaughtered this week by miners is not fourteen not nineteen, but 73. It is a genocide, as attorney general Aristides Junqueira rightly recalled. This genocide, however, did not begin now, but in 1987, when the first massive invasions of the Yanomami territory by miners were registered. Since then, at least about 2 thousand Indians have been killed, which means that 15% of the total Yanomami population have been exterminated.

Of these deaths, at least 22 were murders committed by miners. Almost all Indians were killed with firearms, and some were clubbed or stabbed to death. The miners killed men, women and children alike, and impunity prevailed. Since then, constant conflicts between the Yanomami and invaders have been taking place, probably involving other homicides. Because the Indian territory is located in a remote area which is difficult to access, many cases of aggression are not registered at all.

Most Yanomami were killed by diseases, particularly malaria. Although it is endemic in the region, malaria became a tragedy for the Yanomami since their lands began to be invaded. More and more outbreaks of the disease were registered as the miners advanced, socially disorganizing several communities. Debilitated by the disease, the men could not hunt or fish to feed their families. Undernourished, the Indian population became more susceptible to other diseases, such as tuberculosis. In some villages, 80% of the population died.

Last year alone, about 4 thousand Yanomami caught malaria; 78 of them died. The year before, 6,788 cases of the disease were registered, with 79 deaths. In spite of the operations that were carried out to remove the invaders, no measures were taken to prevent them from returning. Presently, the government itself calculates that 600 miners are active in the area, continuing to bring diseases and death to the Indians.

But the miners are not the only ones to be blamed for the genocide. They invaded Yanomami lands because they were allowed to. In 1990, just before the end of his term as President, Jose Sarney created three mining reservations in the lands of these people, as an attempt to consolidate the invasion. Mining businessman Jose Altino Machado led the first massive invasion of the area by miners in 1985. The army troops stationed at the Indian area took no measures to prevent invaders from entering it. Politicians and businessmen of Roraima have been promoting campaigns to put an end to the demarcation of the Yanomami Indian Area by encouraging actions such as the massacre that took place this week. Therefore, all of them are also responsible for the genocide of the Yanomami.

VIGILS AND PROTESTS TO MARK MASSACRE OF NATIVE PEOPLE IN BRAZIL

August 23, 1993 . . . The massacre of more than 73 Yanomami Indians in the Brazilian rain forest last week will be marked by a silent protest vigil at noon Wednesday, August 25, at the Brazilian consulate, 630 Fifth Avenue, New York City. The event, organized by Amanaka'a, is being coordinated with similar protests by other concerned organizations, including a vigil in San Francisco at the Brazilian consulate (Wednesday, noon P.D.T.) sponsored by the Rainforest Action Network. Participants are encouraged to wear black and neither speak or eat during the vigils as expressions of sadness and mourning. In addition, representatives from various organizations are meeting on Thursday with the Brazilian Ambassador to the United States. The chief of the Yanomami Indians, Davi Kopenawa Yanomami, in an open letter to the public, calls for the Brazilian government to move for the "definitive withdrawal of all the gold miners still working on Yanomami lands." His letter also calls for prosecution of the contractors and politicians who support and encourage gold miners who threaten and kill the native populations. In support of the Yanomami Indians, more than 60 organizations have signed a letter to Dr. Itamar Franco, President of Brazil, requesting an investigation of the crimes, punishment of the killers and a guarantee for the human rights of all Brazilians. Organizations signing the letter include environmental groups and Indian defense organizations such as the Environmental Defense Fund, Greenpeace NYC, National Wildlife Federation, the Sierra Club and the American Indian Community House, among many others. Amanaka'a Executive Director Zeze Weiss asks organizations and individuals to join the protests in San Francisco or New York or to organize peaceful protests at other Brazilian consulates. Individuals are encouraged to fax letters of protest to the Brazilian President and Minister of Justice, as well as letters to U.S. Congressional representatives in support of the Yanomami Indians. Amanaka'a is a non-profit organization advocating the protection of the rain forest and its peoples. It brings a defacto "Amazon Embassy" for native leaders to Washington and New York. Amanaka'a maintains direct contact with the leaders of the native populations and is a primary information source for matters pertaining to the peoples of the Amazon rain forest and their environment.

YANOMAMI KILLING: FOEI MEETS WITH BRAZILIAN AUTHORITIES, EXPRESSES DISMAY ON BEHALF OF NGOs WORLDWIDE, ASKS FOR IMMEDIATE PROVISIONS FOR SECURITY AND PROSECUTION OF INSTIGATORS.

Friends of the Earth International Amazonia Program Coordinator, Roberto Smeraldi, met this morning with the President of the Brazilian Government Indigenous Agency (FUNAI), Claudio Romero, following to the killing of at least 19 Indians (among them 10 children) in the Yanomami reservation in the Amazonian State of Roraima. The crime has been allegedly committed by a group of garimpeiros (gold miners illegally digging the area).

Smeraldi expressed dismay on behalf of FOE and other NGOs from virtually any country in the world, which have been engaged in an international campaign in favour of the basic rights of the Yanomami people, one of the largest indigenous populations in the Amazon region. He also stated that FOEI had written three times in the last few months to the Brazilian Minister of Justice asking for providing security in the Yanomami area.

He also suggested that, beside looking for those who executed the killing, authorities should evaluate the responsibility in the crime of those local politicians who, still last Saturday, had openly instigated on TV broadcasts local goldminers to invade the area "even with a bloodshed, if necessary".

Mr. Romero, after a meeting with Minister of Justice Mauricio Correa, assured that FUNAI has already asked all the relevant Government bodies to mobilize the needed resources for investigating the crime, and announced that a meeting with Federal Police to examine any connivance at the local level will be held tonight in the Roraima capital of Boa Vista. So far, according to the President, it was impossible to reach the area by helicopter, since it is covered by a very close rainforest.

Mr. Romero also agreed at the FOEI request of investigating whether such an unprecedented brutality could be related to the ongoing campaign, promoted by some Roraima authorities, aimed at obtaining a reduction in the extension of the Yanomami reservation. (end)

The massacre by goldminers illegally occupying indigenous land of perhaps dozens of Yanomami Indians in the Brazilian rainforest last week will be marked by a silent protest vigil tomorrow at 11:00 a.m. in front of the Brazilian Embassy, 3006 Massachusetts Avenue, N.W., Washington, D.C.

We have received a "message to the whole world" from Yanomami chief Davi Kopenawa, recent recipient of a U.N. Global 500 Award, calling for "a campaign in all countries" against the massacre. The protest vigil is being held in response to Davi Yanomami's appeal, which we reproduce below:

" This is a message to the whole world. I appeal for help to the Yanomami people. I don't know the exact date. A massacre occurred in the area of the Haximu village, done by goldminers. Two malocas (the circular common house of the Yanomami people) were burnt and everything was destroyed: hammacks, arrows, pots were broken through by bullets and burnt. They were hired guns, paid by somebody. On the second day I went to the camp, in a place called Tapiri", where people from that village used to live while staying out in the forest. The goldminers came and killed two whole malocas. I found many signs of bullets, calibre 12 and 20. I found two bodies, bones, one head with signs of bullets. Other bodies disappeared. We found signs of chuteira (a typical shoe used by goldminers) along the creek. Only goldminers wear chuteira.

I am asking for a campaign in all countries against the massacre and also to send many letters to the Brazilian Government, asking for urgently removing goldminers from the Homoxi area and the whole border area. I also ask to the government to destroy the airstrips. There are two of

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them still operated around here. Please ask for capture of the criminals and prosecution. I am, as Yanomami chief, very disgusted.

I am not taking part in the search of other bodies, I stay here without doing anything. Other people are doing this work so that they can say that Indians lie. We, the Yanomami, know better than they do. That is why I wanted to participate in the search to find the bodies, and they didn't allow me to do it and go with them. I am sad because local parliamentarians from Boa Vista are manipulating this event.

The tone that we hope to convey at the vigil will be one of somber mourning. Participants are encouraged to wear black, although it is certainly not necessary. By protesting we hope to encourage the Brazilian government to:

- * Conduct a thorough and open investigation (with the participation of Yanomami representatives) of the recent tragic events and bring the perpetrators to justice.
- * Remove all goldminers from the demarcated Yanomami Park and ensure that the Park will be protected from illegal invasions.
- * Destroy illegal airstrips inside the Yanomami Park.
- * Act expeditiously to physically and legally demarcate all other indigenous lands in accordance with the Constitution of Brazil.
