## Povos Indígenas no Brasil

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### A Group of Indians in Brazil Is Said to Speak 4 Languages

BRASILIA (Agence France-Presse) — Palikur Indians living on the frontier between Brazil and French Guyana are able to speak four languages, the National Indian Foundation of Brazil reports.

The Indians, who live in the village of Diapoque in the Amapa region, can communicate in their own Aruak-group language, in French, in Portuguese and also in a mixed tongue.

The Palikurs live in close touch with the people of French Guyana, where they commute to work because of higher wages.
